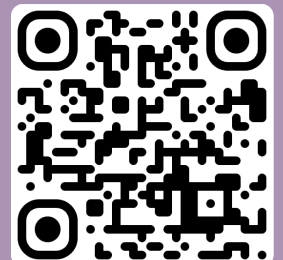

- What does it feel and smell like?

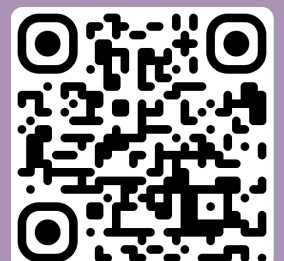
- How does it make you feel inside?



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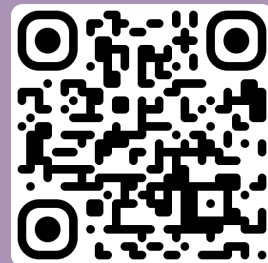


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Write a short story about how people (and animals!) might feel if this season was gone.

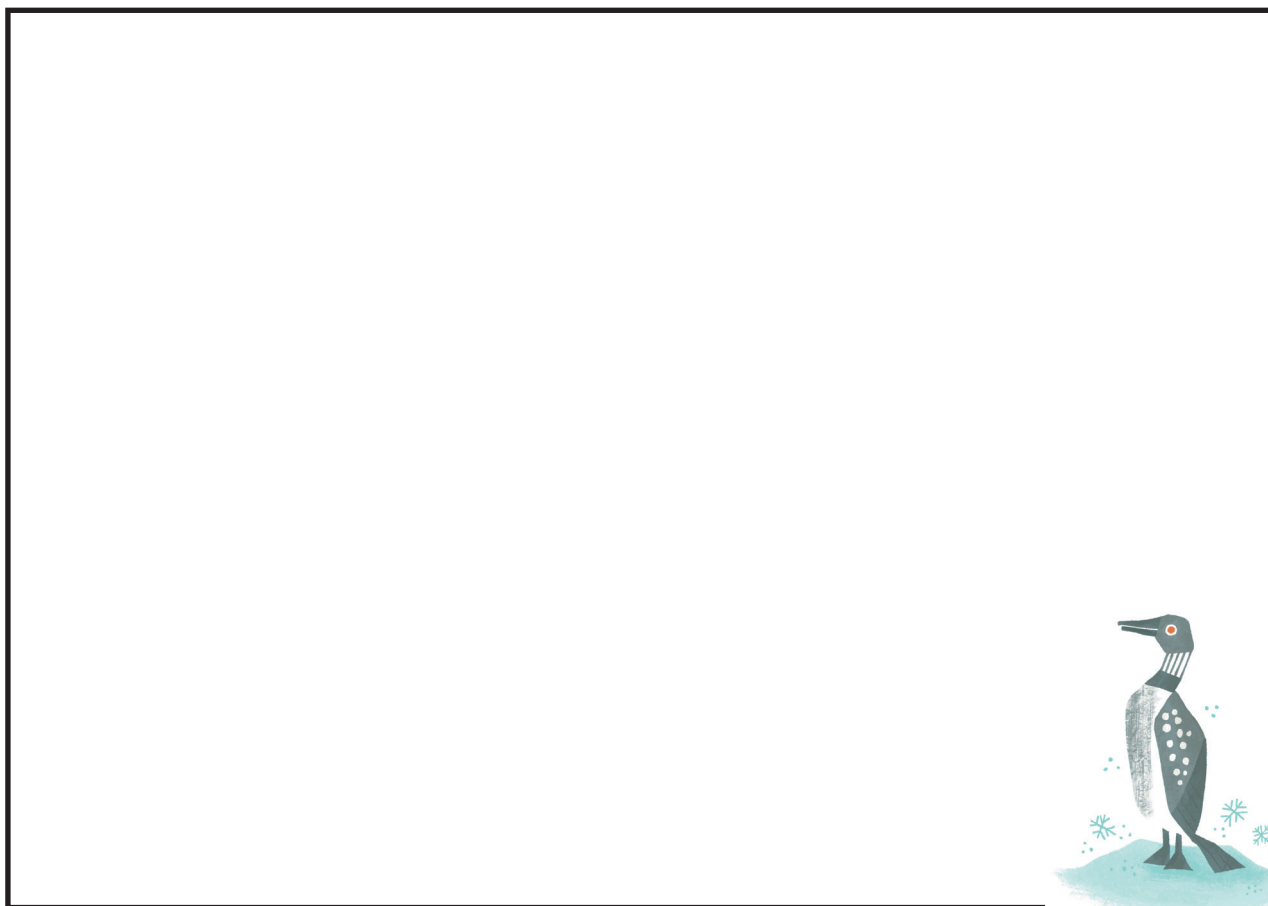


Draw Your Favorite Season

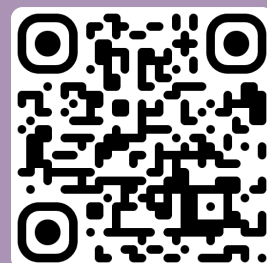
Now that you've written about your favorite season, it's time to draw it! You can think about:

Head outside and collect some dry leaves in all shapes and sizes—big, small, curly, or smooth!

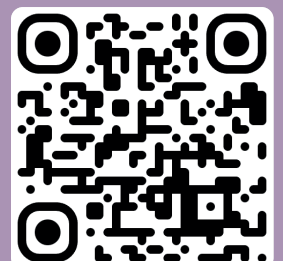
Use paint or pens to decorate your leaves with different patterns, shapes, and colors.

Use your imagination and create your very own folktale about how it came to be!

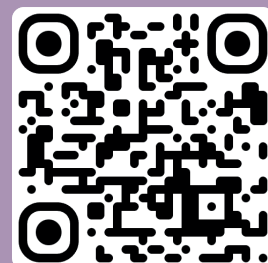
In your story think about:

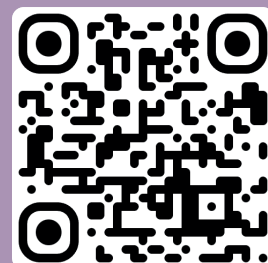
- Who are the characters? (A brave hero, a talking animal, or an evil trickster?)

You can use the next page to get started.



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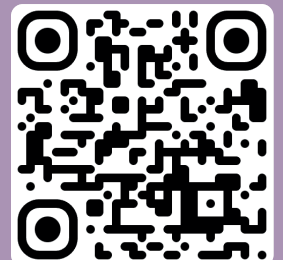


Track the Locations

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Adventure to a New Land

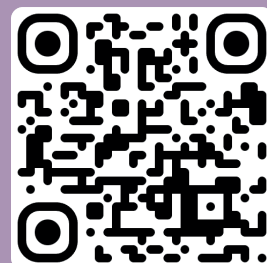
Explore your chosen land and find out about:

Write down all the cool things you've learned on the next page.

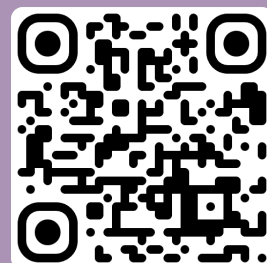


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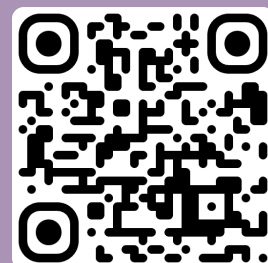

- What lessons do their stories teach?

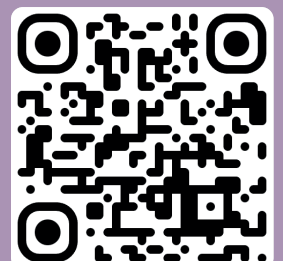

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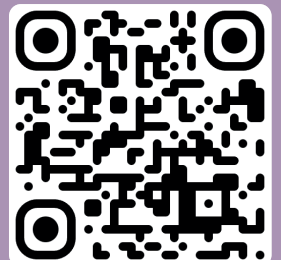

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Make a Cloud in a Jar!

Have you ever wondered how clouds are made? Here's your chance to make one yourself—in a jar!

You'll need:

- A glass jar
- Hot water (ask an adult to help!)
- A bit of hairspray (or smoke from a match, with an adult's help)
- Ice cubes

Here's how to do it:

1. Pour some hot water into the jar—this makes warm water vapor.
2. Quickly place the lid on top and put ice cubes on it.
3. Watch as the air inside cools down—the water vapor turns into tiny droplets!
4. Spray a little hairspray into the jar and cover it again—the cloud will appear!

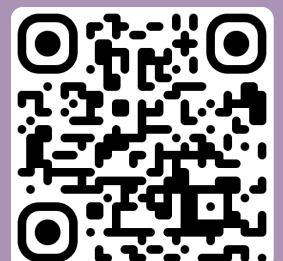
